Psalm 121: Assurance of God's Protection

- ² My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.
- ³ He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber.
- ⁴ He who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.
- ⁵ The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade at your right hand.

- ⁶The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night.
- ⁷The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life.
- ⁸ The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and for evermore.

In these turbulent days let us remember and take courage from God's power and steadfastness as we journey through Lent towards Easter and experience anew the joy of Christ's resurrection. This prayer, written by Kathy Galloway, seems a fitting way to finish.
